Mr. Musleh's Learning's from Incidents



The banksman placed his hand between bundles to align a piece of dunnage. His right hand thumb was caught between the top of the dunnage and the metal grating bundle, crushing his thumb.

Cat lacked "a Tension

The driller hooked the Cat line onto the elevator and together with a floorman began to remove the retaining bolts from the link lock. As the floorman pulled the elevator bail towards him from the side, the elevator dropped due to a lack of tension on the Cat line landing on the floorman left foot. Link

Broken handle—broken wrists

Whilst tightening a ratchet strap the handle on the ratchet came out of its socket causing the stores assistant to fall backwards resulting fractures to both his wrists













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
